## FIVE SYSTEMS DEFINITIONS

SYSTEM NAME	DEFINTIION
<b>1: Worship</b>	This is an obvious one for us as Catholics. Our primary act of worship is the celebration of the Eucharist. Worship can include prayer meetings and times of praise experienced in small groups.
<b>2: Evangelization</b>	<p>This is the proclamation, or kerygma: the Good News of God’s love revealed in Jesus, and the salvation offered through his cross and resurrection. It is proclaimed to those who do not know Jesus.</p> <p>Evangelization brings people into an encounter with Jesus Christ and leads them to a decision to trust, follow him and become his disciple.</p> <p>Evangelization will seek to bring those who respond to that encounter to the sacraments of baptism or reconciliation. It is directed to those outside of the Church, but may also be aimed at those within the Church who know about Jesus but do not know him personally.</p>
<b>3: Discipleship</b>	Discipleship is the lifelong process of growing, maturing and learning that the believer eagerly enters into if truly evangelized. It includes catechesis, but cannot be reduced to it. It includes growing in faith, knowledge, prayer and identifying one’s God-given gifts.
<b>4: Fellowship</b>	Fellowship is community – what the New Testament calls koinonia, the common life. It is meaningful community where people are known and loved, called by name and supported in their call to holiness. It may include socializing, but cannot be reduced to it. Fellowship happens when parishioners are accountable to and for one another.
<b>5: Ministry</b>	<p>Ministry is service to others. It includes essential ministry within the life of the parish so that it can function and form its members, but exists, in a missionary culture, to go out and serve those who do not belong.</p> <p>The true measure of the life of ministry in a parish is not how many lectors a parish has, but the proportion of ministry that is going out to the “existential peripheries,” as Cardinal Bergoglio called them.</p> <p>He restated this rather forcefully in <i>Evangelii Gaudium</i>: “I prefer a Church which is bruised, hurting and dirty because it has been out on the streets, rather than a Church which is unhealthy from being confined and from clinging to its own security.” (EG, no. 49)</p>

These five systems overlap and cover the same dimensions of church life as do the ten values. Analyzing the overall health of the parish through an honest evaluation of the health of these systems is another means to arrive at a starting point of developing a strategy for renewal of a parish.

# Ten Values Analysis

## 1. Giving Priority to the Weekend

- a. More time is spent by the pastor and key staff on the weekend experience than on the rest of the week
- b. The Sunday Mass is a Wow moment for the parishioners
- c. Our Mass schedule gives us sufficient time to gather, celebrate the Eucharist and connect afterwards
- d. People are unconcerned about going over the sacred 1-hours mark and turning into pumpkins
- e. Our building(s) facilitate a meaningful and transformative Sunday Experience

## 2. Hospitality

- a. We have a dedicated and trained hospitality team in our parish
- b. At parish social events, parishioners go out of their way to welcome people they do not know
- c. The marginalized (the poor, people with mental illness, etc.) are intentionally welcomed in our parish
- d. We have an intention welcoming process for new parishioners in our parish
- e. It is obvious to visitors that we presume we have non-churchgoers, non-Catholics and visitors in every weekend Mass

## 3. Uplifting Music

- b. We have a high quality of music in our Sunday liturgies

## 4. Great Homilies

- a. The preachers in our parish speak to the whole person: mind, heart, conscience and will.

- e. The pastor preaches a visioning homily once a month at all Masses

## 5. Meaningful Community

- a. In our parish, parishioners are accountable to and for one another.

- e. At our parish, we seek to grow a sense of belonging by measuring it.

- e. We have annual initiatives when these expectations are revisited and communicated

7. Strength-Based Ministry

- a. We use our church to build up people and not people to build up our church.
- b. We have a defined tool to help parishioners discover their God-given strengths and talents.
- c. When matching people to ministry, we begin with the person and not with the need.
- d. Key teams in our parish are composed intentionally using a strengths assessment tool of some kind.
- e. Serving in and through our parish is always life-giving and energizing.

8. Formation of Small Communities

- a. Our parish is a communities of communities where people are know, loved and cared for.
- b. We have a defined system of small and/or mid sized groups in our parish, and belonging to then is considered a normal part of being a parishioner.
- c. After evangelization, getting people into small and/or mid sized groups is out top pastoral priority.
- d. The ministries and groups in our parish do not depend on the direct oversight of the pastor.
- e. Caring for one another spiritually is the responsibility of all, and not just the pastor.

- a. The majority of our parishioners can testify to a powerful experience

- d. In our parish we discern but also welcome various manifestations and gifts of the Holy Spirit.
- e. In our staff meetings and pastoral council meetings we invoke and wait upon the Holy Spirit

# Forming Intentional Disciples

### THRESHOLDS FOR CONVERSION

Inquiry Phase	Initial trust:	<p>A person is able to trust or has a positive association with Jesus Christ, the Church, a Christian believer, or something identifiably Christian.</p> <p>Trust is not the same as active personal faith. Without some kind of bridge of trust in place, people will not move closer to God.</p>
	Spiritual curiosity:	<p>A person finds himself intrigued by or desiring to know more about Jesus, his life, and his teachings or some aspect of the Christian faith.</p> <p>This curiosity can range from mere awareness of a new possibility to something quite intense.</p> <p>Nevertheless, a person at the threshold of curiosity is not yet open to personal change. Curiosity is still essentially passive, but it is more than mere trust.</p>
	Spiritual openness:	<p>A person acknowledges to himself or herself and to God that he or she is open to the possibility of personal and spiritual change.</p> <p>This is one of the most difficult transitions for a postmodern nonbeliever. Openness is not a commitment to change.</p> <p>People who are open are simply admitting they are open to the possibility of change.</p>
Catechumen	Spiritual seeking:	<p>The person moves from being essentially passive to actively seeking to know the God who is calling him or her.</p> <p>It is, if you will, “<b>dating with a purpose</b>” but not yet marriage. Seekers are asking, “Are you the one to whom I will give myself?”</p> <p>At this stage, the seeker is engaged in an urgent spiritual quest, seeking to know whether he or she can commit to Christ in his Church.</p>
